Try this at home

Activity 1

Compose a melody (a tune) for someone special to you. Think about the types of sounds you associate with them. For example, if they are a happy person, create a happy tune. Perform it to them by whistling. humming or using a homemade instrument.

Activity 2

Create a nature 'soundscape.'

Go outside and listen to the sounds of the birds in nature. If you have a device, you could record these sounds. If not, just try to remember them. When you get home, recreate these sounds using your voice or any objects.



Activity 3

Pick a favourite story and compose a musical accompaniment for it.

You can use musical instruments (real or homemade) that represent the characters or events in the story to enhance the experience!



Collect an assortment of glass jars

and fill them with different amounts of water. See what sounds they make when you tap them with a wooden spoon. Can you compose a song with your new instrument?


